

Glenview Squares' calendar for spring and summer of 2020 was crammed. We had planned dances, workshops, meetings and the club's 70th anniversary blowout party, slated for May 2020. When the pandemic brought everything to a halt, the silence reverberated. As presidents of the nearly 100-member club, we knew that if we wanted the club to still be vital when the pandemic subsided, we would have to keep members active and connected in as many ways as possible.

Zoom showed us the way forward. Soon we had figured out ways to dance remotely. Many club members went along with virtual lessons and dances. This led to the most social of dances being reduced to singles or couples, in living rooms and basements, dancing with two or three imaginary other dancers while a caller guided them from their computer screen. Somehow we made it work.

From online dance lessons and meetings, our club activities expanded to online theater outings and lecture sessions, Zoom-based games and play-readings, and even full-scale virtual dances. We held socially distant square dances in a local church parking lot, with my husband James [left] as caller. And our team made a point of phoning members to see how they were doing.

Fast forward to May 2021. Glenview Squares is making plans to offer lessons and club dances, hopefully for Fall 2021 (CDC guidelines permitting). We are still here. We are ready. Let's dance.


